



## **An Apple For the Teacher**

School is back in session. Children all over the country are picking out new backpacks, lunchboxes, folders, and clothes. There are many shared experiences when it comes to back to school season. Over the years, schools have changed from one room school houses to large, modern buildings. Children have gone from carrying books to carrying laptops. One thing that hasn't changed is the idea of an apple for the teacher. Children may not be taking actual apples to their teachers any longer, but the apple still appears everywhere in gifts and decor associated with teachers. It made me wonder how the tradition got started.

In early 19<sup>th</sup> century America, and especially in small towns, teachers were often paid with food. Apples were a popular choice because they were abundant and easy to transport for these farm families. At the same time, education was becoming increasingly important, and teachers were seen as role models and mentors. The simple gesture of gifting a sweet, juicy apple let them know their work was appreciated.

Over time, the apple became more of a symbol. In fact, some people associate the apple with wisdom and knowledge based on the story of Adam and Eve--which is ironic because the Bible never tells us what kind of fruit Eve ate from the forbidden tree.

Apples are mentioned a handful of times in the Bible, and I especially like Proverbs 25:11. "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver." Isn't that a pretty visual?

A word fitly spoken is when a person says something wise, helpful, or kind at just the proper time. Have you ever experienced that? It's a thing of beauty, just as when silver and gold are used in art or dinnerware or architecture. It can lift your spirits, soothe your soul, and encourage your heart.
